



## Dressing the Rabbi

### Free to Choose?

As we ready ourselves for Shavuot, we need to think about what kind of freedom the Jews experienced after the Exodus. We need to make sure we avoid becoming enslaved again.



## Freedom Chol HaMoed Shabbat Pesach 2010/5770

Thought I would do a little wardrobe enhancement. Having come of age in the 1970s, I first thought of a Hippie theme. Then I thought I'd like to be a bit more contemporary and hit upon the Homey Look

I became stuck though, because, as a rabbi, something's wrong with either picture. Not becoming. Not respectful. Not fitting the position.

Correct on three points, but there's something even more incongruous with this picture - for me it represents a form of mind-numbing slavery, a capitulation to style that many adolescents make to fit in and find a peer group without considering the implications of their style choice.

Some might say, "that's really being free - choosing to dress as you please on the cutting edge of style." But I think donning a tie-dye shirt or letting my jeans sag and my boxers hang out represents a surrender of my soul and inner self.

Let me explain and to do so, I'll need to elucidate the concept of Freedom. In America, we think "freedom" means as the dictionary defines it - exemption from external control or regulation. We think freedom means "freedom from" restrictions, freedom to do what you want, where you want, and when you want. Freedom is partying with wild abandon and sharing the pictures on Facebook without fear of repercussions at the office. Freedom is letting it all hang out - literally. We think "freedom from."

The story of Passover teaches a different kind of Freedom - not "freedom from," but "freedom to," freedom to serve God.

When God rescued the Jews from Egypt, He took them from an enslaved existence. The word in Hebrew for Egypt is Mitzrayim, meaning "a narrow, constricted place of distress." In Mitzrayim, the Jews led a life of drudgery and hard work, a life without purpose and meaning. Their narrow existence of meitzar focused on finding straw and forming the next brick, of finding enough food, and hoping an Egyptian sadistic taskmaster wouldn't kill them that day. From this meaningless life God led the Jews to freedom.

The freedom of the Jews was not just "freedom from" the restrictions and regulations of a tyrant and despot. It had a purpose. It was the "freedom to" serve a benevolent God who would share his Torah and lead the Jews to the Promised Land.

When God instructs Moshe to speak with Paroh, He says:

Here God tells Pharaoh, "Let my people go," but the second part of the sentence explains the purpose, "so that they may serve Me."

Many Americans have adopted the understanding of "freedom from." They live lives without external regulation or restriction. Yet despite the greatest wealth and time in the existence of human beings, we suffer from an epidemic of depression, emptiness, escapism, and addiction. Go into any bookstore and you can find self-help books on any topic under the sun. With all our freedom from restriction, we certainly haven't bettered ourselves. Something is terribly wrong.

What's wrong is our conception of freedom. We need to move away from a concept of "freedom from" to "freedom to."

There is a word for Freedom in the Torah -- chofshi. In Shemot 21:2, we read:

"2 If thou buy a Hebrew servant, six years he shall serve; and in the seventh he shall go out free for nothing."

When constructing the liturgy for Passover, our Rabbis ignore the word for Freedom in the Torah and use a different word - cherut. In the Haggdah, we celebrate that the Jews went MeAvdut L'cheirut - from slavery to freedom - and we call ourselves Bnai chorine - free people. In the Siddur, we call Passover Zman Cheiruteinu - the time of our freedom.

Why? The answer appears in a Midrash from Pirkei Avot 6:2:

"And tablets were the handiwork of God and the writing of God was carved on the Tablets" (Shemot 32:16). Don't read here "carved," rather "free", for the only free person is one who busies himself with learning Torah.

According to the Rabbis, the real meaning of the sentence in the Torah is that only God's Torah frees us from a meaningless existence. Our souls are like the tablets. Dedicating our souls to spiritual undertakings is engaging in the Divine - it is like God writing on the tablets, and therein lies true freedom, the freedom to serve.

Jewish freedom is not escapism, is not the absence of restriction. Jewish freedom means journeying toward God to understand what truly lies in our souls and who we truly are. If we only imitate the society around us without critical thought, if we only pursue material possessions, if we only seek escapism and diversion through entertainment we can't remember two days hence, we in fact become enslaved to a different mindless slavery - a slavery devoid of hard work and devoid of meaning.

Some people like to point out that the maddening list of cleaning and the regulations and restrictions of Passover hardly feel like the Festival of Freedom. We work hard cleaning to rid our homes of Chametz, we pull out Passover dishes, we shop like crazy and cook until we're ready to drop. At the Seder we partake in a meal with a plethora of minutae, eat this much Matzah, drink this much wine, do it in this amount of time, quit eating before midnight. In the synagogue we have a robust list of prayers to recite. How can we be free if the days of Passover are filled with regulations?

The freedom of Passover is the freedom of meaning, of purpose, of service to God and others, of finding happiness through a life that matters.

So at this season, when there is a custom to sport new clothes, I think I'll pass up both the Hippy and Homey look. I'd like to think about my choices first and make sure that the clothes I choose free me and don't enslave me.
